Ruth Sherlock is an International Correspondent with National Public Radio. She's based in Beirut and reports from Syria and other countries around the Middle East. Ruth was previously the United States Editor for The Telegraph, covering the 2016 election. Before moving to the US in the spring of 2015, she was the newspaper's Middle East correspondent.

She has lived in several countries across the Middle East and reported the Arab Spring in those first tumultuous years. She lived in Libya there throughout the war there, reporting from opposition front lines. In late 2011 she travelled undercover in government held areas in Syria, documenting the arrest and torture of opponents to the regime of Bashar al-Assad. When the war began in earnest, she was smuggled numerous times into rebel held parts of the country. She also developed contacts on the regime side of the conflict, travelling the country several times with a childhood friend of Bashar al-Assad.

Her Libya coverage won her the Young Journalist of the Year prize at British Press Awards. In 2014, she was shortlisted at the British Journalism Awards for her investigation into the Syrian regime's continued use of chemical weapons. This work also formed part of the evidence cited in a United Nations report on the issue. She has twice been a finalist for the Gaby Rado Award with Amnesty International for reporting with a focus on human rights.
